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Chinese for Children: Toddlers, Kids and Teens

We believe early exposure to Chinese language and culture can tremendously benefit children's cognitive, social, and emotional growth. Our education programs are designed to build a solid foundation for children to develop linguistic skills, strengthen cross-cultural competence, and pursue life with an open mind.

Pre-School Programs

Our ***Mandarin Munchkins*** and ***Toddler*** classes are designed to provide children ages 1 to 4 exposure of Chinese language and culture. These classes focus on the basics of early childhood development, including improvement of children's social, emotional, cognitive and motor skills in an immersive and interactive learning environment.

Afterschool Mandarin Enrichment Classes

Our enrichment classes are designed to meet the needs of our students by age, language level and topics. Classes are great for students exploring Chinese as a second language while deepen their understanding with Chinese culture, providing rigorous practice in a small-classroom setting. Classes are available for students of all ages and language levels. Online options are available.

Intensive Literacy Classes

Intensive Literacy classes are for students at all levels working towards mastering language skills in speaking, reading and writing, and perfect for speakers of Chinese at home, as well as students looking to take the next step in enhancing their Chinese language studies. Designed to target student's reading and writing abilities, Intensive Literacy curriculum uses textbooks for Chinese students at top schools in China. We offer introductory, intermediate, and advanced literacy levels.

Immersive Mandarin Summer Program for Children

Each summer, we welcome child(ren) ages 2-15 to our Lower Manhattan location to explore Chinese language and culture. Over the course of 6 weeks, our caring teachers, teaching assistants and staff members create a dynamic and interactive experience that incorporates thematic language classes, culinary classes, musical instrument workshops, shadow puppet theatre workshops, Chinese literature for children, and more!

Hoppy Rabbit Playdate

China Institute Hoppy Rabbit Playdate program offers 1.5 hours open session where families can bring their children to our spacious and cozy indoor playground space to play, socialize, have fun with age-appropriate toys and activities. This is also a great time to meet children and families interested in exploring Chinese language and culture. All families are welcome!



For the Youth: Study Tour in China

Meaningful people-to-people exchange has been at the core of China Institute's mission since its inception in 1926. Study tours in China for American high school students provide transformative experiences for the youth to develop a deeper understanding of Chinese culture, sharpen leadership skills and strengthen global competence. During the study tour, students may be engaged in intensive language classes, workshops, home stay experiences, youth forum with Chinese students and cultural excursions in multiple cities in China.

Chinese Language Classes

Mandarin Chinese: from Beginner to Advanced Levels

Learn to speak, read and write the official language of China. China Institute's small-sized group classes, led by experienced language teachers, offer a wide range of Chinese language courses at every proficiency level, from building the foundational blocks of pinyin and Chinese characters, to carry on highly interactive discussions on thought-provoking topics on contemporary China, students will find a class that meets their specific needs and schedule, as well as a community supporting life-long learning.

Heritage Chinese

This course is designed specifically for heritage Chinese learners who possess speaking skills but limited in reading and writing. It will introduce basic vocabulary, sentence patterns and phrases, and fundamental grammar rules, and move on to more complex and functional vocabulary and systematic review of grammar.

Classes are offered in-person or online. Please check China Institute's website for specific classes.

Chinese Culture Classes

Classical Literature ([online](#))

Since 2009, Ben Wang has taught a comprehensive range of courses on classical Chinese literature and art, from the Book of Songs to Literati Painting from the 10th through the Mid-20th centuries, exclusive to China's culture. Among them are the latest 3 semesters of Story of the Stone, 3 semesters of ballads by Bai Ju-yi and Li Bai of the Tang, and a 3-part selection of Li Bai's poetic works, as well as Literati Painting of 2 Ming masters. The quintessence of all these works -- their brilliant tonal and rhyming schemes that accompany the splendor of the timeless texts, and the unique learning of etymology: the indispensable inner spirit of Chinese culture -- is unraveled in detail. The enduring beauty and profundity of the works have held students, numbered from 22 to 34, in rapt ever since.

Modern Chinese Literature ([online](#))

Modern Chinese literature presents a cultural and intellectual transformation that reflected the impacts of political turmoil and societal collapse and rebuilding. A new writing culture emerged and reached immediate florescence in active responses to all the historic themes packed in China including revolutions and wars, poverty and reforms, censorship and ideological fights, and particularly the language itself breaking from the two-millennium tradition of literary Chinese.

Modern China Through Film—Chinese Families in Transition ([online](#))

This 6-week course explores the changing Chinese families through Chinese fictional cinema made during the two decades after the mid-1990s. It will focus on feature films about Mainland China by the so-called fifth- and sixth-generations filmmakers, and some younger, newly emerging balinghou (post-1980s) directors who came of age after the millennium. Participants will gain an understanding of modern and contemporary Chinese film, history and culture as well as familiarity with the Chinese movie industry and its major players.

Understanding Dao De Jing 《道德经》 ([online](#))

Through 8 lectures delivered in English, this course will help the attendees gain an comprehensive understanding of Dao De Jing (also called "Tao Te Ching") while grasp the literal understanding of the text. This course treats Dao De Jing as philosophy in literature, or literature for philosophy, and summarizes its content into 5 stories, namely, the story of the Way, Virtue, Man, Non-action and Rulers, through examining 5 groups of related philosophical questions.

Studio and Music Classes

Brush Painting (*online*)

Led by renowned artist and instructor Ms. Sungsook Setton, this virtual class provides training in the fundamentals of traditional brush painting, as well as its principles, techniques, subject matters and styles. Themes covered include landscapes, birds-and-flowers, insects, fish, and others. Students are trained to master brushstrokes and taught the skills of capturing the essence of forms.

Chinese Calligraphy: Beginner I (*online*)

This 10-week course is designed to introduce students to the fundamental principles, techniques, and history of the Kaishu style, through step-by-step instructions and hands-on practice. The class covers various aspects, including tools and materials, principles and aesthetics, stroke techniques, and more.

Chinese Calligraphy (*in-person*)

Students are taught how to use the brush and given an artistic and etymological introduction to China's system of writing. Students learn and practice basic brush strokes and characters in a meditative, relaxed atmosphere.

Tai Chi (*in-person*)

This course teaches the philosophy and practice of Yang-style Tai Chi, a short form of sixty postures developed by Grandmaster William C.C. Chen. Intermediate students will learn the long form of the Yang style, which develops core strength

Mediation and Qigong (*online*)

In this course, students learn to align the internal energy, or Qi 氣 with the natural rhythms through guided meditative techniques and flowing Qigong/Taichi movements. The combination of the Eight Pieces of Silk Brocade (Baduanjin 八段錦), Healing Standing Qigong (Zhan Zhuang 站桩) & Taichi movements will be introduced to generate greater flow of Qi through centering, grounding and fluidity.

Guqin (*in-person*)

Regarded by Chinese as the most elegant of all their musical instruments, Guqin produces delicate music from seven strings. *Guqin Beginner* class is designed for students who have not studied the instrument before. The class will explain Guqin tablature (notation), basic fingerings, and the three tone colors: open strings, pressed tones, and harmonics. Students also learn to play two to three short traditional and contemporary pieces.

At *Guqin Intermediate* students learn to read more advanced tablatures (notation), correct hand postures, and more complex fingerings (separate, advance and return, back and return, lift, knock, push out, etc.) as well as two or more intermediate-level pieces.

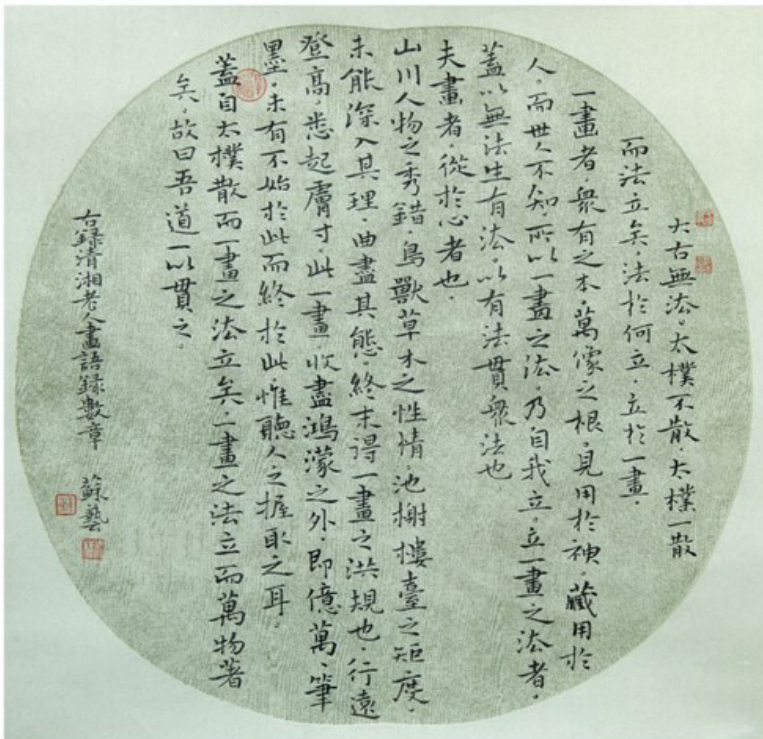
Pipa (*online*)

The pipa, or Chinese lute, is an ancient instrument that is both elegant and playful, charming, and adaptable to both traditional and modern sounds. Pipa class for the beginner level guides students through fundamental techniques, Chinese notations, and scales. In addition to learn to perform, students also gain historical insights into the pipa's origins and major schools. Students aiming to perform as soloists can join *Pipa Advanced* class to explore masterpieces such as “Ambushing from Ten Sides” (十面埋伏). In addition to modern compositions utilizing numbered and staff notations, students will delve into the traditional Gongche notation (工尺谱) too.

Private Tutoring

Private tutoring through China Institute offers a flexible and personalized alternative to group classes, giving each student the opportunity to learn Chinese, at a preferred time, and according to one's individual needs. Our experienced teachers will customize the syllabus to address each student's specific learning style and objectives. With a user-friendly online platform, our program also provides students with an engaging and effective virtual learning experience.

In addition, the program we offers tailored Mandarin Chinese SAT II & AP Test Prep lessons from exceptional instructors in one-on-one or small group settings.

Educational Programs for Schools

China Institute is a primary resource for K-12 teachers and students to learn and experience Chinese culture. First chartered as a school for continuing education by New York State in 1944. China Institute is currently a sponsor of Continuing Teacher and Leader Education (CTLE) hours approved by the New York State Education Department.

Teacher Certificate Program: Understanding Chinese Culture and Practice

Jointly designed by China Institute and East China Normal University in China, the *Teacher Certificate Program: Understanding Chinese Culture and Practice* is an innovative certificate program for K-16 teachers of Chinese as a second language. Monthly online seminars present carefully selected cultural topics by renowned experts, each followed by guided discussions, facilitated with educational experts. In addition, guided by master teachers, participants will have the opportunity to join pedagogical workshops and in-depth coaching to practice bridging culture and language teaching in classrooms.

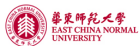
Participants will get certificate for CTLE (Continuing Teaching and Leadership Education) hours approved by the New York State Education Department. PDP certificate is available for members of New England Chinese Language Teachers Association (NECLTA).

Upon completing required participation of seminars and workshops, participants will get a “Certificate in General Understanding of Chinese Culture”, jointly issued by China Institute and East China Normal University.

This program is in partnership with the Institute of Global Chinese Language Teacher Education, East China Normal University, New England Chinese Language Teachers Association (NECLTA) and Chinese Program at Tufts University.

China Institute's We All Live in the Forbidden City program offers a series of standards-based, interactive programs that introduce K-12 students to Chinese history and culture. Children will dive deep into the program's subject matter—developed in conjunction with the award-winning “We All Live in the Forbidden City” series of children's books—through animated videos, interactive storytelling, group discussion and creative activities. All workshops are led by the Institute's experienced educators and lessons are adjusted according to grade level.

For the school year 2024-25, we offer up to 25 free workshops for all Title I schools. All other public and private schools qualify for subsidized rates.

Curriculum Guides & Lesson Plans

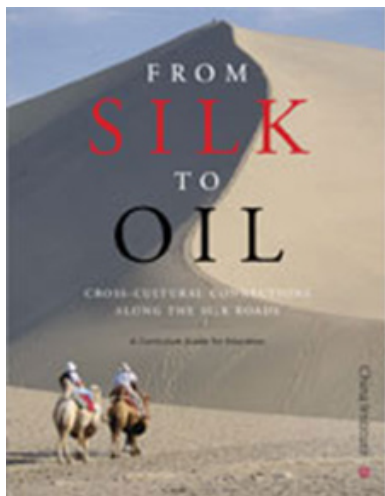

Curriculum Guide: From Silk To Oil

Travel the deserts and mountain passes of Central Asia with *From Silk to Oil: Cross-Cultural Connections Along the Silk Road*. This book of global studies curriculum, funded by the U.S. Department of Education and produced by China Institute, begins in the second century BCE and ends in the contemporary period.

The twenty-three curriculum units consist of a lesson plan, written and visual documents, maps, tables, and even a Silk Roads board game. There is also a glossary; lists of additional resources; and a CD with the entire text and color images-including hotlinks to relevant websites-in PDF format.

From Silk to Oil is directed at teachers at high school world history, global studies, social studies, geography, literature, and art. Some units will also be suitable for advanced middle school, community college, and lower-level university survey courses.

Instructors

Ben Wang, Senior Lecturer of Language and Humanities at China Institute. He has lectured extensively on classical Chinese literature, literati painting, calligraphy, and theater. Mr. Wang received the National Prize in literature translation awarded by the National Literary Association of Taiwan. He was awarded Outstanding Citizen of New York City by the New York City Council in 2003. Since 1989, Mr. Wang has translated 39 classical Chinese poetic dramas into English.

Ping Wang earned an MA from Long Island University in TESOL (Teachers of English for Speakers of Other Languages) and a BA from Peking University, Beijing, China in Western Languages and Literatures.

Steve Zhang received graduate degrees in history and classical studies. He has published on literature, history, and culture in mainland, Taiwan and the United States and served on the board of editors for translation series Approaching China.

Lan Yang holds an MSED in Literacy Education from Queens College, CUNY. She is a certified NYS Chinese teacher and holds certificates in ACTFL's (American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages) Oral Proficiency Interview (OPI) and Written Proficiency Test (WPT).
